
Journeying Through the Materials in a Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Atrium: The Model Altar

This week, we think about a material that is essential to understanding the liturgy of the Mass: The Model Altar. The Model Altar area in the atrium consists of a model sized (smaller than child-sized) altar, Tabernacle, and Ambo, along side a piece of cabinetry referred to as the Sacristy cabinet where all the articles of the Mass (in miniature) are stored. Children at a young age are fascinated with nomenclature, and love knowing the names of each article of the Mass! For the 3 year old, they are shown how to set the altar very simply with the basic items of: 1) the altar cloth 2) the chalice 3) the paten 4) the crucifix and 5) the candlesticks. After teaching the child the nomenclature for these items, and demonstrating how to properly set the model altar, if the child would like, we light the candles for them and invite them to pray. Some pray with song, others with silence and others with words, but it is very common for them at all ages to choose to sit in prayer in front of the model Altar. I am reminded of the tiniest children age 3 who commonly sat in front of the model altar once each Atrium session, whispering to Jesus or softly singing to Him. In these moments, we respect the child's conversation with God and allow them this sweet, uninterrupted time in prayer, which usually always centers around thankfulness. In this way, we learn so much from even the youngest of children about how to pray! As time goes on, the children are given the nomenclature and models of additional Articles of the Mass including the ambo, lectionary, Roman Missal, tabernacle, sanctuary lamp, ciborium, bells, thurible, corporal, purificator, lavabo, pall and cruets. The children sometimes enjoy even creating a book with labels and drawings of the Articles of the Mass. It is so beautiful to see the child joyfully recognize and be able to name these beautiful objects when they see the real versions at the Holy Mass!
